

Master's Degree (MTh) Contemporary Systematic Theology (One Year)

Admission requirements

The minimum entry requirement is a primary degree in which theology comprises at least an equal joint honours component (or equivalent). Candidates should have obtained at least Second Class Honours, Grade II overall, and Second Class Honours, Grade II in Theology. An interview will normally be part of the selection procedure.

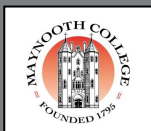

Why study Systematic Theology at Maynooth?



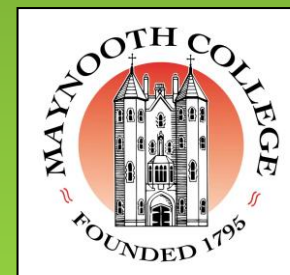
St Patrick's Pontifical University, boasts a rich academic heritage, opening its doors in 1795 to students of philosophy and theology.

Will the course suit me?

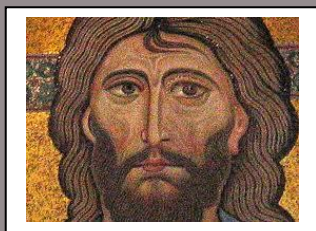
The programme is suitable for those wishing to undertake post-graduate level study in systematic theology.

The Course provides:

a detailed study of some of the main themes of Systematic Theology including: Faith and Revelation, Trinity, Creation, Christology Ecclesiology, Grace, and Sacramentology.

a focus on twentieth-century theologians for e.g. Karl Rahner, Henri de Lubac, Joseph Ratzinger, Yves Congar, Hans Urs von Balthasar

a chance to critically explore more recent developments in systematic theology e.g. religious pluralism, the relation between religion and science, and contextual theologies.

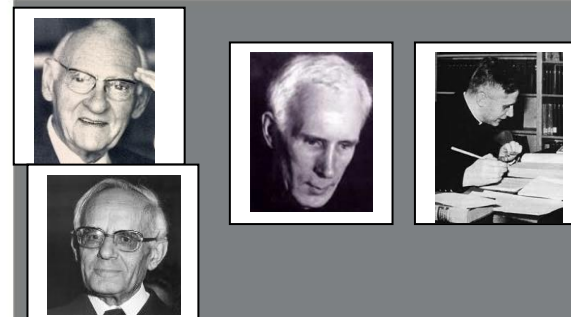


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How is the course delivered?

The course will consist of 6 modules [**three modules per semester**] (10 credits each) delivered over two Semesters of 10 weeks per module and the completion of a dissertation/thesis of 15,000 words (30 credits)

Modules will be delivered on Monday and Wednesday evenings and assessed by essay (5,000 words).
